#### 5.3 Realisation of the objectives

The four objectives are achieved by the academic paper I wrote. In the paper, I critically review quality theory and person theory and argue that neither can explain both phenomena. In light of Kolodny (2003) and Bagley (2015), I propose a temporal relationship theory (TRT) and argue that love between two people is justified if they are in a relationship for which a similar interpretation of the history, understanding of the present, and anticipation of the future of some identify-shaping ends of the relationship is shared. TRT can explain both the constancy and selectivity of love and the role of the beloved's qualities and identity in the justification of love.

#### 6. Research Outcome

6.1 Major findings and research outcome (Maximum 1 page; please make reference to Part C where necessary)

This academic paper provides a comprehensive analysis of existing love theories, namely quality theory and person theory, highlighting their limitations in explaining the full spectrum of love's nature. The paper underscores that while quality theory focuses on the beloved's personal attributes and person theory on their identity, neither can fully account for love's constancy, selectivity, and the role of the beloved's qualities and identity in love's justification.

Addressing these shortcomings, this paper introduces the Temporal Relationship Theory (TRT). This novel theory posits that love's justification lies in a shared interpretation of the past, present, and future regarding identity-shaping ends in a relationship.

The central finding of the paper hinges on TRT's ability to provide a more holistic understanding of love. It integrates elements from the existing theories while introducing the critical dimension of shared temporal perspective. Thus, TRT offers an innovative and comprehensive framework for understanding the justification of love, emphasizing the importance of shared interpretations and expectations within a relationship's temporal continuum.

6.2 Potential for further development of the research and the proposed course of action (Maximum half a page)

Potential areas for further development of this paper could include empirical testing of the Temporal Relationship Theory (TRT). This could involve designing experiments or surveys to investigate whether shared interpretations of a relationship's history and anticipated future indeed correlate with feelings of love and relationship satisfaction.

Another avenue could be to apply TRT to different types of relationships beyond romantic ones, such as familial relationships, friendships, or even professional relationships, to explore its universality.

The paper could also benefit from a deeper examination of how individual and cultural differences might impact the perception of "identity-shaping ends" and the shared interpretation of a relationship's timeline.

#### 7. Layman's Summary

This study dives deep into how we understand love, particularly what makes us love someone and keep loving them over time. It takes a critical look at existing theories about love. One theory says love is due to the qualities of the person we love, like their kindness or intelligence. Another theory suggests it's more about the identity of the person, who they fundamentally are, that makes us love them.

However, this paper points out that both theories have their limitations and don't fully explain why love can be both selective (why we love certain people and not others) and constant (why we continue to love the same person over time).

To fill this gap, the paper introduces a new theory, the Temporal Relationship Theory (TRT). TRT suggests that love between two people is justified when they have a shared understanding of their relationship's past, present, and future.

This paper is important because it offers a fresh perspective on understanding love. It combines the best bits from the existing theories and adds a new dimension, the shared timeline, making it a more comprehensive explanation. This could help us better understand our own relationships and what keeps love strong over time.
