5.3 Realisation of the objectives

The objective of the project "Hong Kong Journalists' Oral History" 《香港報 人口述歷史》, is to add information and insight to the literature of Hong Kong journalism by providing an unique, primary historical information for future researchers by recording the experiences of Chinese journalists which might otherwise have been lost. The video-recorded interviews capture the historical events leading to the growth of the Chinese press in the mid-20th century, as well as the rise and fall of the Chinese press in Hong Kong. The interviews also reveal the news coverage of the political upheavals of China in the 50s-70s of the last century and the socio economic changes of the Hong Kong Government under the British rule. Viewers/readers can see clearly the performance of newspapermen from both the party paper and the general newspaper – how to inform the public and shape the public opinion of that time; and the speedy expansion of the popular newspaper and the decline of the party papers.

In total, 28 veteran journalists were interviewed; 6 of them passed away. The interviews were mainly carried out in the studio of the Department of Journalism and Communication, Hong Kong Shue Yan University. A digital recording was made for each interview. The interview was then edited and transcribed; and names, dates, and events were verified. Afterwards, the interviewee reviewed and corrected the transcript and the video production.

A Chinese book, named "Number of People: Hong Kong Journalists' Oral History" (數風雲人物: 香港報人口述歷史), in 2 volumes is now in the process of publishing by Cosmos Books Ltd and is expected to be on sale in bookstores in December 2017. A 40-hour video production with Chinese sub-titles under the same name will also be uploaded onto the University website for public viewing. Later, when the newly-built Hong Kong News-Expo opens in 2018, both the book and the video USB will be displayed there.

Broadcasters' oral history in Hong Kong is another area of study which should be done in the near future as many of them have already been retired. Veteran broadcasters telling their stories in their own words and with their perspectives on the transformation of the broadcasting industry from analogue to digital of the last century will definitely give insights for researchers to go deep into the practitioners' adaptability to the technology change of the communication industry. At the same time, these interviews will reveal the socio economic change of the community in the last century.

7. Layman's Summary

Hong Kong, under the British rule, has been transformed from a fishing harbor to an entry port, a trading center, a light industry manufacturing center, and eventually an international financial center in the last century. It was a miracle! Isn't it?

The narrative memories of veteran journalists might be able to provide you answers to the success story of Hong Kong. From their stories, you can see the socio economic development of Hong Kong with the influx of illegal immigrants from the Mainland in the 60s and 70s of the 20th century; the government policy to cope with the new immigrant; their respective news handling of the "1967 Leftist Riots" in Hong Kong; and their respective coverage of Chaotic China before "The Reform and Opening Policy" of Deng Xia Ping in 1978; the political reform of the colonial government in the 70s; the rise of the popular newspaper and the decline of the party paper.

Hope information provided be useful in designing future studies in journalism education, also the socio political development of Hong Kong during the British rule of the 20th century.
