5.3 Realisation of the objectives

All the objectives have been fully achieved after the completion of the project. A total of 30 participants have participated in this study. Upon data collection between 1 Apr 2021 and 31 Aug 2022, the data (interviews and photographs) have been analysed by thematic analysis. The initial findings on health care workers' meanings of residential care works and their perceptions about the "dirty work" metaphor (objective 1) and their experiences with the impact of the "dirty work" metaphor (objective 2) were unpacked and presented at conferences (see Part 9) and published in an international journal (see Part 8). One manuscript addressing health care workers' self-perceived meaning of residential care work (addressing objective 2) and the final paper on "Revitalising the meaning of residential care work for older people: A photovoice study" (addressing objective 3) have been submitted to international journals for review.

6. Research Outcome

6.1 Major findings and research outcome (*Maximum 1 page*; please make reference to Part C where necessary)

Residential care is an essential part of the integrated continuum of the long-term care (LTC) system for older people, particularly for those whose intrinsic capacity has severely deteriorated and when family care is not available. Despite the importance of quality LTC in ensuring that older people can still experience healthy ageing, the aged care sector has long been socially devalued and stigmatised compared with the acute care setting. This study adopted photovoice methods to unveil the voices of health care workers in residential care homes for the elderly (RCHEs), exposing the meaning of aged care work from those insider workers. The health care workers were endowed with positive meaning and important, rewarding experiences from their aged care work in the context of Hong Kong. Four themes were explored in this study including (1) supporting the holistic wellbeing of older people; (2) valuing aged care as a profession; (3) learning in work; and (4) caring under constraints.

The findings of the study have been reported and disseminated through presentations in 5 recognised regional and international conferences (see part 9) and one international journal (see part 8). Two more manuscripts have been written and submitted to journals for review.

6.2 Potential for further development of the research and the proposed course of action (Maximum half a page)

The findings of this study provided evidence on health care workers' positive meaning of work. More specifically, the assigned positive meaning intrinsic to care work, including supporting comfortable ageing of older people, establishing a meaningful relationship, engendering professional identity, and learning and growing in work, contributed to workers' intentions to stay in the LTC sector and provision of high-quality person-centered care to older people.

During the study process, it is noted that the well-being of health care workers constituted an undervalued part of their working experiences. Future research that explores the well-being of health care workers and the impact of their well-being on their work experiences will certainly contribute to the development of a more comprehensive understanding of health care workers' work experiences in RCHEs. With an intention to investigate the unexplored area that this study has identified, the investigators are preparing a proposal for the upcoming round of FDS application.

7. Layman's Summary

This study unearthed the voice of the health care workers in residential care homes for the elderly (RCHEs) in Hong Kong through delineating their insider meanings of RCHE work. The findings revealed that health care workers considered their work experiences as positive, important, and meaningful, despite of the negative impact of the "dirty work" metaphor. This study recommends strengthening the positive aspects of health care workers' work experiences in addressing their workforce issues. The findings of this study contribute considerably to our

existing understanding of the RCHEs workforce crisis in Hong Kong from a socio-cultural perspective that is largely absent from the RCHE public "policy cycle" (ie. policy agenda setting, policy formulation, policy implementation, and policy evaluation). This study contributes to generate new insights on the development of policy initiatives to reconstruct the RCHE workforce, resulting in impacts at public policy, RCHE administration, RCHE residents, and academic levels.
