The timetable of the research was extended for six months to allow for travels to Istanbul in winter 2015, as well as the dissemination of research in conferences. I had initially intended to hire a research assistant, but was later told that this was not allowed by RGC under the terms of the HSSPFS, which is why I did not use up my budget fully.

## 5.3 Realisation of the workplan

(maximum 2 pages; please state how and to what extent the work as stated in the workplan has been achieved; give reasons for under-achievements and outline attempts to overcome problems, if any)

The workplan has been achieved. Rather than spending the first 4 months of the research in Sanyuanli, Guangzhou and the next 6 months of the research in Xiaobei, I alternated between these two sites throughout the research, since this is what my informants did, specifically working in Sanyuanli during the day and going to Xiaobei at night. I traveled to all the sites I had intended to travel to, except for Lagos (which, at the time I intended to travel there, was under threat of the Ebola virus, which killed a traveler); instead, I traced out low-end globalization trade in Bangkok and then Istanbul, meeting my informants from Guangzhou in these cities. I traveled to Istanbul in February 2015. I also did research in Dubai, Nairobi, and Yiwu and other Chinese cities, as originally planned. My research unfolded as I had anticipated: I was able to do what I set out to do.
