#### 5. Workplan

- 5.1 Workplan as per original application
- 1. 2011-12: Major tasks: update my knowledge of Western European economic history, collect comparable historical materials and studies in Europe and the USA, and refine my use of System of National Accounts methods on Chinese and Dutch historical materials. I will spend the summer in Europe and the USA to discuss with the scholars and collect data and will also use university funds to invite some scholars to visit Hong Kong as well.
- 2. 2012-13: Major tasks: data collecting and processing. I will collect a variety of newly available materials mainly from libraries, archives and academic institutions in China, in particular Beijing, Shanghai, Nanjing, Hangzhou, Suzhou Taiwan and Japan.
- 3. 2013-14: Major tasks: write a book as the final product of the project. In the process of the writing I will consult economists, accountants and other experts some of whom live outside Hong Kong.

#### 5.3 Realisation of the workplan

(maximum 2 pages; please state how and to what extent the work as stated in the workplan has been achieved; give reasons for under-achievements and outline attempts to overcome problems, if any)

Since this research is pioneering and nobody has tried before, there are no readily available data and no systematic comparable statistics with which to compare the Netherlands and the Yangzi Delta in the early nineteenth century. Therefore, I have to comb through numerous first hand sources to create comparable indices of economic performance. This job is time-consuming requiring in normal circumstances months or years.

These first-hand sources are stored mainly at the archives and libraries in mainland China, Taiwan, Europe and the USA. I had spent the year of 2011-12 collecting the materials, but I had only covered 50% of the most essential data by so far, which represent virtually all the data that I can access electronically or through the libraries and archives available in Hong Kong. The other 50% of the data I needed were much more difficult to cover, because they are either scattered in the massive central archives. These "new" materials are very important to my research. Unfortunately, many such sources are not indexed and even not well categorized. Others are classified as "precious works" and are not available to be xeroxed, scanned or photographed, and can only be hand copied. To collect these materials, a one-year extension was needed and RGC has finally approved an 8-month extension.

The work as stated in the workplan has been achieved quite well. As a result, the major tasks of the research plan have been achieved, which are:

- (1) Collecting, processing and analyzing archival and library data
- (2) Meeting with colleagues from Europe and the USA who are working in the field of Western European economic history
- (3) Consulting economists, accountants and other experts to make a better use of the System of National Accounts and a more reasonable global comparison of the economies of the Yangzi delta and the Netherlands.

To achieve the tasks, I have done the following works during the project period:

(1) Data collection

I spent considerable amount of time in libraries and archives in mainland China and the USA, including the National Library and the Library of Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (both in Beijing), the libraries of University of Michigan (USA), Tsinghua University and Peking University (both in Beijing), Fudan University (in Shanghai), Zhejiang University (in Hangzhou), Academica Sinica (Taipei) and so on, where I collected rich materials needed of the first hand which are crucial to this research.

(2) Communication with colleagues

I attended conferences, meetings, seminars and workshops which were held in Hong Kong, mainland China, Taiwan, Europe and the USA. In these occasions I met leading scholars who are working in the fields related to this project. The communications with them were very helpful.

(3) Paper writing

With the progress of the research, I have completed nine articles, five conference papers and seven lecture papers which will be the core of the book that I am working on.

  - I. A draft of three core chapters of the planned book has been finished (in English), but modification are needed, in particular in the improvement of the English expression. Some parts of them have been published or accepted by academic journals. The remaining two chapters are expected to be finished by March 31 2016.
