









6.3 Realisation of the objectives

1. Enhancing participants' understanding of the empirical investigations, practical applications, and social implications of meaning-enhancing interventions and meaning-centered psychoeducational programmes that span cultural and developmental perspectives.

Objective 1 of this project was fully achieved: First, the expertise and background (including cultural background) of keynote speakers were diverse, including scholars, researchers, practitioners, and mixed with training in counselling psychology, clinical psychology, cultural psychology, and experimental psychology. Second, the average ratings of participants on "the content of the seminar/workshop was useful" (4.36 to 4.69 out of 5, refer to section 6.7 evaluation results). Third, the average ratings of participants on "the presenter use examples to make the materials easy to understand" (4.08 to 4.82 out of 5, refer to section 6.7 evaluation results). The diversity of speakers and high ratings from participants showed that the events of this IIDS project (Meaning in Life International Conference 2022) helped to enhance participants' understanding of the empirical investigations, practical applications, and social implications of meaning-enhancing interventions and meaning-centered psychoeducational programmes that span cultural and developmental perspectives in cultivating, promoting, and enhancing meaning in life.

2. Facilitating dialogue between scientists and practitioners toward developing culturally sensitive and developmentally appropriate meaning-enhancing interventions and tailored practices from an interdisciplinary perspective.

Objective 2 of this project was fully achieved: The expertise and background of the participants of this IIDS series were diverse. The mixture of academic scholars and researchers (72%) with practitioners (28%) from various fields helped to facilitate dialogue between scientists and practitioners by toward developing culturally sensitive and developmentally appropriate meaning-enhancing interventions and tailored practices from an interdisciplinary perspective. Furthermore, the videos of keynote lectures and workshops as well as the conference proceedings have been helping to facilitate on-going dialogue between scientists and practitioners on meaning in life research and meaning-centered practices from interdisciplinary, cross-cultural, and developmental perspective.

3. Building participants' competence in designing rigorous scientific research and developing evidence-based meaning-focused interventions to support the well-being of people with diverse cultural backgrounds (between and within-culture) and at different life stages.

Objective 3 of this project was fully achieved: From the evaluation of the six keynote lectures and workshops. The average ratings of participants on "the presenter is knowledgeable about the subject" (4.52, 4.31, 4.43, 4.69, 4.80, 4.73, 4.80, and 4.60 out of 5, refer to section 6.7 evaluation results) and "the presenter stimulated interest in the course" (4.43, 4.23, 4.36, 4.63, 4.30, 4.64, 4.70, and 4.80 out of 5 refer to section 6.7 evaluation results) were high. These evaluation results supported that the keynote lectures and workshops could arouse participants' interests and build their competence rigorous scientific meaning-focused research evidence-based meaning-centered interventions. Furthermore, the videos of keynote lectures and workshops as well as the conference proceedings could be used as teaching and training materials to build the competence of local and overseas researchers, practitioners, and graduate students in designing rigorous scientific research and developing evidence-based meaning-focused interventions to support the well-being of people with diverse cultural backgrounds and at different life stages.

1) Theme and Key Objective:

The theme of the three-and-a-half-day MIL International Conference 2022 was cultivating, promoting, and enhancing meaning in life across cultures and life span, and this conference aims to enrich international and intellectual exchange and discussion on empirical-based and evidence-based MIL research, practice, and applications. The three and a half day international conference comprised six keynote lectures (K1-K6), two keynote workshops (KW1-KW2), twelve breakout sessions (with 40 paper presentations and 5 e-poster presentations) categorized into twelve subthemes: (i) MIL and Post-traumatic Growth, (ii) Perspectives on MIL, (iii) MIL and Education, (iv) MIL, Prosociality, & Well-being, (v) MIL Across Lifespan, (vi) MIL and Lifestyle, (vii) MIL Across Cultures, (viii) MIL, Religion, and Spirituality, (ix) MIL with Suffering, (x) MIL & Resilience, (xi) MIL and Identity, and (xii) MIL & Existentialism. In addition, a local forum and panel session about Life and Death Education in Hong Kong (in Cantonese) was held on the last day of the MIL 2022.

2) Keynote Speakers, Presenters and Participants:

This IIDS project targeted local and overseas scholars, researchers and practitioners (particularly in the fields of education, gerontology, mental health, nursing, philosophy, psychology, public health, and social work) who have expertise or interested in meaning in life research or meaning-centered interventions.

I) Keynote Speakers and Presenters:

There were two keynote speakers from United States, two keynote speakers from United Kingdom, one keynote speaker from Israel, and one keynote speaker from Japan). There were 112 presenters (authors and co-authors) from 16 countries and the following table shows the distribution of presenters by country of origin. (II) Participants

There were 362 non-duplicated registrants (participants) for the Meaning in Life International Conference 2022 (MIL 2022) from 37 countries from Africa, Asia, Australia, Europe, Northern America, and Southern America. About three-fifths (59.4%) were local participants and about two-fifths (40.6%) were international participants. The project team further categorized the registrants into three categories: i) Academics (e.g. faculty, researchers, post-doc fellows etc.), ii) Practitioners (e.g. clinical psychologies, counsellors, educators, social workers, coaches etc.), and iii) Students (e.g. graduate and undergraduate students). Among the registrants, 139 (38.4%) were academics, 126 (34.8%) were practitioners, and 97 (26.8%) were students. These statistics reflected the diverse cultural and professional background of the participants. The following table summarizes the country of original and professional background (categories) of the participants.

7. Research-Related Outcome

7.1 Potential for development into research proposal and the proposed course of action (Maximum half a page)

This completed IIDS project led the PI and Co-Is to develop the following two research proposals with two keynote speakers as well as four presenters and/or international programme committee members of MIL 2022 of this IIDS project:

- 1) Prof CHAN Chi-keung (PI) has submitted a FDS proposal application for the round of 2023-24 application (co-I, UGC/FDS17/H03/23) titled "The Interplay between Meaning in Life and Social Axioms on Psychological Well-being Across the Life Span" and aims to i) to identify the patterns of adverse life events across different age groups, ii) to build the pathways from adverse life events to psychological well-being, and iii) to examine the interplay between meaning in life and social axioms on these pathways. Dr. RONG Wei-sun is the PI of this application. Dr Joel VOS, Joel and Dr RUSSO-NETZER, Pninit (two keynote speakers of this IIDS project) are the co-PIs for this new FDS application.
- 2) Prof CHAN Chi-Keung (PI), Dr CHUI Chi-fai (Co-I), Dr. SIU Yat-fan (Co-I), and Dr. Lam Yin-hung (Co-I) submitted an IIDS proposal (for the round of 2022-23 application) as Co-Is with Dr. LAI Ching-han (PI of the FDS application, HKSYU; International Programme Committee member of MIL 2022) titled "Pursuing Eudaimonic Wellbeing: Exploring the Roles of Psychology of Spirituality and Transcendence in Facing Life Adversities" which aims to organise an international conference on spirituality and transcendence. Dr. LAI Ching-han was one of the participants. Besides, three other International Programme Committee members (Dr Kong Hong-man, EduHK, Dr LAU, Esther Yuet-ying, EduHK and Dr. Cheung Hin-wah, TWC) of MIL 2022 International Conference are also the Co-Is of this IIDS proposal (UGC/IIDS15/H01/22). The new IIDS proposal received a rating of 3.0, and the team has re-submitted the revised proposal (UGC/IIDS15/H01/23) for the round of 2023-24 application.

We expect these research collaborations to have relevant impacts for research and practice locally and internationally. For the conference proceedings (#1), the conference chapters contributed by the keynote speakers have provided theoretical and methodological framework for designing and developing research and interventions related to cultivating, promoting, and enhancing meaning in life. The other chapters have provided empirical evidence on meaning in life research across cultures and religion, and life span. The two manuscripts (#2 and #3) are published in the special issues targeting international scholars, researchers, and practitioners who are interested in meaning in life. These two manuscripts have linked meaning in life to values and social axioms among young people in Chinese. Potential cross-cultural and life span studies can be further developed to understand the universal and differences across different counties and/or developmental stages.

7.3 Any new development and/or challenging research topic(s) has / have been identified and any new initiative(s) for future research has / have been inspired.

This completed IIDS project (MIL International Conference 2022) has also inspired the project team for establishing potential collaborations with some keynote speakers, presenters, and participants to identify and develop the following new research initiatives and topics in the near future:

- 1) Prof CHAN Chi-keung (PI) just attended the International Positive Psychology Association 8th World Congress (20-23 July 2023) and met two keynote speakers of MIL 2022 (Prof. Michael F. STEGER and Dr Pninit RUSSO-NETZER) and two presenters (Dr Michael ZAMBELLI, Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore (Milan) and Wai-Ting Nicole CHEUNG, Chinese University of Hong Kong) to discuss how to build an international research network based on the MIL 2022 contact list and to plan for an international study on cultivating, promoting, and enhancing meaning in life across cultures and lifespan.
- 2) Prof CHAN Chi-keung (PI) had a zoom meeting with Dr. YUEN Mak-tak (International Advisory Committee of MIL 2022) at the Faculty of Education, HKU on 28 December 2022 to discuss potential research collaboration on cultivating, promoting, and enhancing meaning in life for parents of children with special educational needs and their children at various developmental stages.
- 3) Prof CHAN Chi-keung (PI) had a meeting with Prof KWOK LAI Yuk-ching Sylvia (International Advisory Committee of MIL 2022) from the City University of Hong Kong, Dr FILEP Sebastian from Hong Kong Polytechnic University, and Dr WAN Chi-kwong Bruce on 29 May 2023 to discuss potential research collaboration on cultivating and enhancing meaning in life and appreciation of life through positive tourism or nature-based activities.
- 4) Prof CHAN Chi-keung (PI) had a meeting with Ms. Mega Leung from Research Institute on Flourishing & Suffering of International Network on Personal Meaning (INPM) on 22 July 2023 to discuss how to establish potential collaboration with INPM on research topics related to meaning-centered intervention and transcendence.

8. The Layman's Summary

This IIDS project organized a hybrid Meaning in Life International Conference 2022 (MIL 2022), including six keynote lectures and two workshops delivered by six renowned keynote speakers, twelve breakout and one poster session of 45 presentations with 122 presenters from 16 countries. The concept of meaning in life (MIL) has recently earned a renaissance of interest during the COVID-19 pandemic. The increasing quest for MIL provides the driver for meaning-enhancing interventions and meaning-centered practices, but the efficacy of these interventions is influenced by cultural and developmental moderators. Thus, the MIL 2022 International Conference 2022 focused on the theme of cultivating, promoting, and enhancing meaning in life across cultures and life span that is significant and valuable to existing meaning-centered research, interventions, and practices. This IIDS project successfully facilitated dialogue between overseas and local scientists and practitioners from various disciplines, to gain a better understanding of the meaning-enhancing mechanisms and applications across cultures and life span, develop culturally sensitive and developmentally appropriate meaning-enhancing interventions and tailored practices from interdisciplinary perspectives, and build participants' competence in designing rigorous research for developing evidence-based meaning-focused interventions. The research outputs achieved and potential projects inspired by this IIDS project also confirmed its significance and values.
