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## 1. Executive Summary

As the first year of the new triennium 2016-19, the year of 2016/17 was marked by several breakthroughs that Lingnan University has made in knowledge transfer (KT). In line with the HKSAR Government's advocacy in its 2017 Policy Address for university efforts in promoting entrepreneurship and commercialisation of research outputs, we have initiated new funding and learning opportunities to nurture **student entrepreneurship**, while our first ever **patent filings and trademark registrations** have been in progress since the first half of 2017.

#### **ENERGY**

With resources from the UGC's Recurrent Funding for KT Activities (UGC KT Fund), a ground breaking **Entrepreneurial KT Fund** was created to provide pilot support for our students to explore opportunities of setting up business or social enterprises under the advice of our faculty and professional members. This is built on a series of new initiatives including courses on entrepreneurship and innovation, training programmes and visits to start-up business in Hong Kong and mainland China, and a web-based central platform of information on entrepreneurship and competitions.

On the commercialisation front, **licensing** opportunities and agreements are under discussion on patents and trademarks filed in Hong Kong, the US and other jurisdictions for intellectual property generated from our research. Our academics and KT staff were provided with the necessary **professional development in technology transfer** with resources from the UGC KT Fund. All these unprecedented endeavours, together with our active efforts in supporting entrepreneurship, are geared towards **unleashing the potential energy** and enthusiasm of our faculty and students, with the support of the UGC KT Fund and the University senior management, and the enhanced role of the Office of Research Support in promoting and coordinating the various initiatives as a positive response to the Policy Address.

#### UNDERSTANDING

While technological advancements are to be applauded, they need an **understanding society** to thrive in – not just a place for the adoption of the technology, but an environment where people appreciate each other's needs and aspirations. The impact that we seek to create from our research through KT is to promote the understanding of, *inter alia*, our **youth and elderly**, the **minorities**, **our own culture** and the wider horizon of our nation's **Belt and Road Initiative**.

In the reporting year, **10 new projects** were approved for our **KT Project Fund (KPF)**. Among them is a project which delves into the job seeking difficulties that the South Asian youths in our community encounter, and provides recommendations on government services to enhance their employment prospects. With Lingnan's particular strengths in research and KT of high social and cultural relevance, we were awarded substantial external funds of **\$24.8 million** for contract research, **\$44.4 million** for social and community projects, and a total contract value of **\$78.7 million** for various KT activities, representing an increase of **9%**, **64%** and **32%** respectively over the previous year. These included 3 projects in promoting active ageing which amounted to a total of **\$24 million** from The Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust, 2 projects on the financial and policy implications of the Belt and Road Initiative funded by the Central Policy Unit at **\$1.2 million**, and a forum for the public and practitioners with **\$0.25 million** provided by the UGC. In terms of the number of **beneficiaries** of our KT activities, we are gratified to see yet another jump from 26,600 in the previous year to **37,900** in 2016/17.

#### **REACHING OUT**

Building on the momentum gathered since we launched the KPF which now has **28 on-going projects**, our faculty members continue to reach out to the business and wider community to bring them the

benefits extended from our research outputs, especially in the wake of new regulations and practices that have a bearing on the business environment. In 2016/17, the KPF funded a forum for practitioners to learn about the competition regulations and several seminars on Fintech and commercial operations which engaged industrial partners such as the **Hong Kong Science and Technology Parks** and **Hong Kong Management Association**. Dissemination and sharing of our expertise knowledge was further boosted by the wide media coverage of our academics' interviews and hundreds of news articles both locally and internationally in **CNN International, Times Higher Education, The New York Times** and **South China Morning Post**, just to name a few.

While the challenges that the economy and society present should be well recognised, the endeavours of our research and KT seek to present also the **opportunities** that may be available, to different walks of life, through innovations and more understanding of the local and wider environment, and those are the **societal impact and policy impact** that our KT work strives to achieve.

## 2. Energy of Innovations

## 2.1 Promoting Entrepreneurship

Cultivating students' entrepreneurial spirit and experience is one of the major initiatives in the University's Strategic Plan 2016-2022, which echoes the Policy Address in promoting the development of innovation and technology in Hong Kong. In the reporting year, the University embarked on the establishment of a platform to promote entrepreneurship in a liberal arts context through the **brand new Entrepreneurial KT Fund, formal course offerings, visits to start-ups and business plan competitions**.

## (a) Entrepreneurial KT Fund

This ground breaking fund has just been launched by the **Office of Service-Learning** to support students with innovative ideas, practical solutions and executable plans to start an NGO, social enterprise or company. Each project can receive up to \$20,000 as the seed fund for project or business start-up. Students can use the Fund to develop prototypes for a new product or proof of a new concept that will lead to or is aimed at starting a NGO, social enterprise or company for impact on humanity. Projects that involve concrete



partnership with the community partners/NGOs, and are expected to produce a positive social, economic, environmental and/or cultural impact on the beneficiaries, will be given higher priority.

## (b) Building an innovative culture and capacity

In addition to funding support, we attach great importance to building an innovative culture and capacity. A new **Entrepreneurship course** offered by our **Department of Management** will begin in 2017/18, and there are **9 cluster courses** in the Core Curriculum of undergraduate programmes with the elements of Innovation and Entrepreneurship. A



web-based central platform "CREATE" has recently been set up with information on entrepreneurship competitions and external funding opportunities.

## (c) Training and Exposure

Building on the success of the Youth Entrepreneurship Training Scheme last year, the China Economic Research Programme (CERP) and Student Services Centre (SSC) of Lingnan University

had co-organised the **"Linking You to Innovation"** Entrepreneurship Training, Visits and Internship Programme (「粤港嶺創」大學生創新創業培訓、参 觀及實習計劃), with the generous sponsorship from Ho Iu Kwong Charity Foundation, Home Affairs Bureau, Commission on Youth, Guangdong Youth Federation, Guangzhou Nansha District Youth Federation and



Longgang District of Shenzhen. Over 40 Lingnan students joined the Programme.

In June 2017, participating students attended a threeday training and had the opportunities to visit start-ups and companies of innovations in Hong Kong and mainland China. The students had their knowledge and horizons broadened in learning about how the companies attracted venture capital and went listed. The enthusiasm was fuelled by the **\$500,000** support by the **Commission on Youth** which helped extend the



programme to offering Lingnan students internship opportunities in the finance, e-commerce, innovation and technology industries in the urban districts and Nansha District of Guangzhou, and Longgang District of Shenzhen. Participating enterprises included Vipshop, the third largest e-commerce company in China, Branch of Bank of China in the Pilot Free Trade Zone of the Nansha Area, Guangdong Museum, Guangzhou Zeale Group, Lukka International Limited, Royole, Ba Fang Tong Da Technology, Vigrance and Longer3D in Shenzhen.

#### (d) Lingnan students shine in Entrepreneurship competition

Two Lingnan student teams represented Hong Kong to compete against some 400 teams from other regions of China and won several awards in the China College Students Entrepreneurship Competition 2016 held in Chengdu, including one **Gold Award** in the "**Entrepreneurship Proposal**" category and one **Silver Award** in the "**Social Enterprise**" category.

## 2.2 Commercialising Research Outputs

### (a) First Patent Filing and Trademark Registrations

In accordance with the HKSAR Government's Policy Address 2017 which calls for universities to strengthen the role of their KT offices in co-ordinating and commercialising research outputs and findings, Lingnan is seeking to protect and manage the University's intellectual property (IP) rights, and explore potential ones for patent filing, trademark registration and licensing.

The "Programme Outcomes Management System" (POMS) jointly developed by our Department of Computing and Decision Sciences and the Teaching and Learning Centre is our first piece of IP going through the process of commercialisation. In February 2017, Lingnan's first ever patent filing was done in the US, which was followed by further filing in Hong Kong and forthcoming filing in China as well as trademark applications in Hong Kong, China and Indonesia. The **KPF** has funded marketing activities to explore licensing possibilities with local and overseas partners. This is a breakthrough to Lingnan which enthuses academics to a much wider realm of KT possibilities and raise their awareness in IP rights protection.

## (b) Capacity Building

The Office of Research Support (ORS), being the university-wide research and KT office, has

enhanced its role in co-ordinating and supporting initiatives in commercialisation. By using the UGC KT Fund, ORS had facilitated seven academics and KT professionals of the University to undergo **training in technology transfer and legal matters** in these programmes:

- Tech Transfer Bootcamp a 2-day intensive skills development programme
- Workshop on Setting Royalty Rates and Other Financial Terms
- Workshop on Lurking Legal Traps Awaiting Tech Transfer Negotiators

## 3. Understanding for Social Advancements

## 3.1 Understanding the Minorities

The understanding of South Asian ethnic minorities by the general public of Hong Kong in many cases may be shaped by biased impressions, but more often a lack of understanding of their genuine experiences and importantly their contributions to this city is the problem, even though this ethnic group has already made Hong Kong home for generations. This limits not only their opportunities but also **the part they can potentially play in social advancements**. It has been the persistent efforts of Prof Lisa LEUNG in our Department of Cultural Studies to shed light on their aspirations and difficulties encountered, and the corresponding implications for social policies and services, through a series of KT projects underpinned by research.

The "Job seeking practices of South Asian youths in Hong Kong – Evaluation of employment support services" is her latest KPF project funded in the 2016/17 round. Apart from the practical training programmes to be provided for those young citizens, the powerful impact that KT can make lies in the implications and recommendations that are to be drawn from the project on how to improve the design of existing government support and services to better identify the youths' needs, and thus enhancing their employment prospects.



Taking the research findings to relevant government and organisational platforms for **policy impact** is also the core endeavour of these KPF projects of Prof Leung: "Ethnic minorities and the news media – portrayal and public perception" "Cultural history of South Asians in Tuen Mun – a tour of appreciation"

The partnership built through those projects with NGOs and social groups, and the demonstrable linkage **from research to impact**, well exemplify the notable value of KT and the underlying quality research, including the new project which has been funded for **\$203,528** in the 2017/18 round of the **General Research Fund (GRF)** for Prof Leung's project on "Media and (Minority) Participation of South (East) Asians in Hong Kong".

## 3.2 Understanding our Youth and Elderly

## (a) Active Ageing

The Asia-Pacific Institute of Ageing Studies (APIAS) is a flagship centre of Lingnan University in promoting active ageing and providing elderly care training which is in great demand with an ageing population. The strengths of the Institute is well testified by the support offered by organisations which share our vision. In 2016/17, substantial new



funding was committed by The Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust for three projects.

#### \$8.8 million Jockey Club Intergenerational Communication and Health Promotion Programme

Through the "young and old partnership" applied research and community programmes, the project seeks to cultivate productive ageing, healthy living and intergenerational harmony. Small teams comprising the young and the elderly are formed to work together as ambassadors in early prevention of and intervention in possible problems of health and intergenerational relationship for the community of Yuen Long and Tuen Mun.

#### \$7.12 million Jockey Club Age-Friendly City Project (Phase Two)

This is a four-year project in which APIAS closely collaborates with three other local universities to promote Hong Kong as an agefriendly city among communities in various districts of Hong Kong. The Lingnan research team conducts baseline assessment studies, organises training and district engagement activities, and provides professional support in Tuen Mun and Yuen Long.

The impact of APIAS' work was widely disseminated through channels like the local mass media **TVB** and **RoadShow** which carried interviews with **Prof Ka Ho MOK**, **Director of APIAS**, on the important message of positive ageing.

#### \$8 million Jockey Club "We Care, We Serve & We Learn @ Tuen Mun" Programme

This is a three-year programme carried out by the Office of Service-Learning to promote intergenerational collaboration and active ageing in working with different stakeholders including government departments, non-governmental organisations, academia and business partners. Nine activities were conducted in the reporting year to serve more than **7,200 people** in the community.

Faculty members, students and community partners collaborate to offer better elderly services for the community, train up students as future elderly care givers, and organise regular trainings and forums for the elderly and stakeholders in the community to stimulate innovative ideas and facilitate development meeting the needs of society.

## (b) Listen to the Children

The situation of children in poverty requires our care and study as the children's level of satisfaction towards life is negatively affected by their being deprived of things which average kids take for granted, particularly in places like Hong Kong where there is a glaring gap between the rich and the poor.

Policy implications are sought in the project undertaken by **Prof Maggie LAU of APIAS** and **Prof Stefan KUEHNER of the Department of Sociology and Social Policy** in collaboration with local and international institutions on "**Poverty, disadvantages and children's well-being in Hong Kong**" as part of the **Strategic Public Policy Research project** "Trends and implications of poverty and social disadvantages in Hong Kong: a multi-disciplinary and longitudinal study" funded by the Government's Central Policy Unit and Research Grants Council. Taking the policy impact to wider platforms is the important KT part of the project. In December 2016, a press conference that was covered in 31 media reports was held to release the findings from which international and comparative insights were drawn and disseminated.







## 3.3 Understanding Our Own Culture

Reviving the appreciation for our own heritage and culture often takes us to a wider dimension of life where we may understand and embrace more the place where we find ourselves living in and where there are our own stories. This is a worthy task for scholars in humanities to benefit the community through KT, and here at Lingnan we are gratified to see our scholars taking up this task, with manifest benefits for the public.

#### (a) Revitalising What Made Hong Kong

Reliving our childhood fantasies perhaps is a wish deep in the hearts of many people but long forgotten in the hectic city life. In a \$410,000 contract research project commissioned by the Hong Kong Museum of History, Prof LAU Chi-pang of the History Department and Coordinator of the University's Hong Kong and South China Historical Research Programme translated the research outcomes



into a three-month **exhibition** "**The Legend of Hong Kong Toys**" which was co-organised by the Hong Kong Museum of History, Hong Kong Toys Council and Toys Manufacturers' Association of Hong Kong earlier this year. The partnership among the academia, industry and government is a typical showcase of Prof Lau's many KT projects.

In the exhibition, the general public and visitors were taken to appreciate an iconic part of what has made Hong Kong today – the toys for which so many of the Hong Kong manufacturers and workers sweated in the past century to build our own brands and to export our high-quality and yet low-cost products to overseas markets, thus reflecting the city's social and economic landscape over the years.

The wide repertoire of Prof Lau's projects also include the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Book of the Tung Wah Group of Hospitals which was newly funded for **\$2 million**, and the three-year Hong Kong History Learning Programme supported by The Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust for **\$14.8 million** – just to name a couple of the recent big ones among the **11 on-going projects** at a total contract value of **\$19.5 million**.

Prof Lau's expertise is well-recognised in being appointed to various external advisory bodies including the Government's **Advisory Committee on Built Heritage Conservation** of which he is the **Chairman**.

### (b) Our Rich Cultural Heritage

An audience of **700 people** from the general public, industry practitioners and academia were attracted to Lingnan University for the Cantonese opera performance on campus as part of the "Lingnan Arts Festival 2017" organised by the Faculty of Arts in the first quarter of 2017. It is also a core deliverable of the **KPF** project "**Reviving a forgotten ritual play in Cantonese opera: The female** *Jiaguan* (Blessing of Promotion)" carried out by our Kwan



**Fong Cultural Research and Development Programme** in collaboration with the **Chinese Artists Association of Hong Kong**. This initiative has not only raised the public's appreciation for this precious art of local and UNESCO heritage, but also enhanced the industry standards of Chinese opera professionals through a special educational session in which some near-lost skills and traditions were presented and explained.

## 3.4 Onto the Belt and Road

Growing international interest is now more than evident in the Belt and Road Initiative as advocated by the Central Government and in our nation's 13<sup>th</sup> Five-Year Plan. The determination to spur innovation and economic development along the traditional land and maritime silk routes is echoed proactively by related Government departments, the industrial and commercial sectors in Hong Kong, and is a keen topic of discussion and study to which Lingnan has been working to make its contributions.

Our aim is to deepen, through applied research and KT, the Hong Kong society's understanding in policies and practices that may be derived from the initiative in the international perspectives. We strive to offer timely and practical information to various sectors concerned, so as to enhance their position in tapping the many opportunities which may benefit Hong Kong.

Lingnan has a relatively strong research capacity in economics-related subjects. In 2016/17, our research centres and Faculties of Business and Social Sciences were successful in obtaining policy research fund and organising international forums on the Belt and Road Initiative.

Later this year, a public lecture on the Belt and Road Initiative will be held with the support of **\$250,000** from the **UGC funding scheme for theme-based public lectures**. Prominent speakers in the field including Prof Justin Yifu LIN of Peking University will be invited, and the event is expected to make a great impact on the community and industry.

## 4. Reaching Out to Business and the Public

## 4.1 Enhancing Professional Compliance

Since Hong Kong's Competition Ordinance came into full operation in 2015, the local economy has entered into a new era where anti-competitive business conducts are regulated. This has led to an increasing demand for more related academic research and advice in Hong Kong and the region.

Prof LIN Ping, Director of Lingnan's Centre for Competition Policy and Regulation (CCPR) and a

strong academic in competition policy research, was appointed by the **Competition Commission** in 2015 as one of its **Non-Governmental Advisers** to the **International Competition Network**. The societal impact of his research is brought to play in a **KPF** project funded in 2016/17 on **"Promoting effective compliance and enforcement of Hong Kong's Competition Ordinance"**. It aims to enhance public awareness and understanding of anti-competitive business practices and their detrimental effects on competition and consumers. Workshops and training sessions will be organised for the business sectors and professional organisations on compliance of the law, and the harm and risks of anti-competitive business practices. Policy papers and industry reports on competition landscapes, and newspaper articles regarding compliance and enforcement of Competition Ordinance in Hong Kong will also be published.

## **4.2 Engaging Sector Partners**

#### **Business Sector**

Building on the success last year, our **Hong Kong Institute of Business Studies** (HKIBS) continued its collaboration with business organisations such as the **Hong Kong Management Association** (HKMA) in holding business seminars in town for industry practitioners. In the seminars, research findings were shared by Lingnan academics to address challenging issues facing the business community. A typical example was the seminar on "Key leadership practices for the enhancement of service quality and innovation" given by **Prof CHEN Tingting, Department of** 



**Management**, who shared insights based on her research output published in *Personnel Psychology*.

Seminar participants also benefited from the expertise of **Prof CUI Geng**, Director of HKIBS, who was recently granted **\$494,960** for his study "Construction of Mainland China – Hong Kong Economic Integration Index and Its Application to Facilitate Public Policy Research in Hong Kong" under the **Public Policy Research Funding Scheme** of the Central Policy Unit.

In a professional seminar entitled "Wider Adoption of e-Cheque and Digital Signature in Business Seminar", our Department of Computing and Decision Sciences was one of the co-organisers. We were glad to be in collaboration with the hosts of the seminar, **CMA-Smart City Industrial Committee** and **Hong Kong Science and Technology Parks Corporation**, to enhance the technical knowhow and skills in e-commerce and **FinTech** through this event which was well received by industry leaders and experts in Hong Kong and the Chinese mainland.

#### **Higher Education Sector**

Lingnan academics' expertise is well proven by the University being a partner of the **Centre for Global Higher Education**, the world's largest research centre on higher education led by the **University College London (UCL) Institute of Education** and participated by 10 other leading universities. **Prof Ka Ho MOK**, our **Vice**-



**President** and **Lam Man Tsan Chair Professor of Comparative Policy**, leads a three-year research programme as an important part of this **£6 million** project, and collaborates with the **UCL Institute of Education** and the **Asia Pacific Higher Education Research Partnership** in the US to co-launch the **"Inter-University Research Consortium for Higher Education"**. The research outcomes from these international collaborations are readily translated by Prof Mok into professional and executive training programmes for higher education leaders and delegates from mainland China and Asia, including those from the Shenzhen City College, Zhejiang University, Christ University from India and Red Cross Society of China.

## 4.3 In the International Lime Light

The impact created through KT is often measured by its "reach" and "depth". The mass and electronic media are indispensable platforms to enhance the reach to the general public who otherwise may not have a chance of learning from our faculty's expertise if it is only available in academic publications.

In the reporting year, Lingnan academics were separately featured in **326 media reports or articles**, whether in print or electronic media, locally or internationally. They appeared in interviews by far reaching media channels such as **RTHK**, **NOW TV**, **TVB News**, **RoadShow**, **Chinanews.com**, **EJ Insight**, **ABC Radio National Sydney** and **Radio New Zealand National**.

On topics of Higher Education Development Expert opinion and research findings of Prof Ka Ho MOK, Vice-President and Lam Man Tsan Chair Professor of Comparative Policy are widely covered by local and international media and analyses such as Times Higher Education, University World News, PIE News, BRINK Asia, Master Insight, All China Review, Shafaff University News Network, Hong Kong Commercial Daily and Oriental Daily News. In 2016/17, Prof Mok had made active

contributions to **31 press interviews and news articles**. His recent study on international and transnational learning

in higher education was discussed in a blog entitled "Family, Not Study Abroad, Aids Asian Job Seekers More" in the Voice of America, the official external broadcasting institution of the United States.

#### **On topics of Politics**

Since the time when the world was watching the 2016 US Presidential Election in a mix of fascination and bafflement, **Prof ZHANG Baohui** of our **Political Science Department** and Director of our **Centre for Asian Pacific Studies** has been a much sought after commentator on issues of public interest in the pre- and post- US election implications. With his research specialty in China security, the impact of his expertise was well displayed in his comments and appearance in **26** media interviews or articles in 2016/17 on various platforms such as **Channel NewsAsia**, **CNN International**, **BBC Chinese News**, **CBC News**, **New York Times**, **South China Morning Post**, **Business Insider**, **Ming Pao Daily**, **One News Page** and **Today Online**, **Singapore**.

The 2017 Chief Executive Election held early this year was undoubtedly the hottest topic of discussion in Hong Kong. Lingnan's **Public Governance Programme**, headed by **Prof LI Pangkwong**, had completed **15 opinion survey projects** in 2016/17. Survey results were widely quoted on the radio and in TV channels, newspapers and social media, and Prof Li as a highly experienced political analyst was invited to give his expert opinions in various channels such as the **NOW TV** and **RTHK**.

#### On topics of Heritage

**Prof LAU Chi-pang** of the **History Department** and Coordinator of the **Hong Kong and South China Historical Research Programme** was invited to appear in a series of TV programmes produced by **RTHK** for his research and expertise in historical and cultural heritage of Hong Kong, in addition to an interview by **Commercial Radio Hong Kong** and a number of feature articles by him in newspapers.

## 5. Impact Case Histories

## **5.1 Promotion of Gender Equality**

With proven expertise and research strength in gender studies, women's employment and family issues, sexuality studies and Hong Kong culture, **Prof Annie CHAN** of the **Sociology and Social Policy Department** has been actively engaging with the community, women's organisations and various stakeholders. For two consecutive years, she succeeded in obtaining RGC's **General Research Fund** to conduct the projects on –

- "All by Myself?" A study on the situations of singles in two Chinese cities General Research Fund (\$549,400) 2018
- Transnational Transformations? How Transient Migration Shapes Intimate and Family Relations of Transnational Professionals in Hong Kong General Research Fund (\$478,484) 2017

Those are in addition to a project recently funded by the **Equal Opportunities Commission** on "A study on knowledge and victimization experience of sexual harassment in the service industries: Comparing recent female Mainland Chinese immigrants with locally-born women".

Prof Chan extended her **research for impact** through the **KPF** project on "**Mainstreaming gender mainstreaming: Engaging stakeholders and the community**". The important element of outreach in the project is a user-friendly Gender Mainstreaming tool-kit developed for twelve member organisations of the Hong Kong Women's Coalition on Equal Opportunities, NGOs and other stakeholders such as the Women's Commission. It is for their use in advocacy, policy assessment and monitoring, as well as public education purposes. Hardcopies of the tool-kit were sent to NGOs and a digital version is available online.



An outstanding part of this KT initiative is the high level of social relevance and close partnership with the social groups. To advocate gender mainstreaming and promote the use of the tool-kit, two workshops were organised in 2016/17 and more will be conducted for the target beneficiaries. For **policy impact**, Prof Chan will collaborate with the Women's Coalition to lobby the Women's Commission and the Government to review existing Gender Mainstreaming instruments and procedures.

## 5.2 Nurturing Citizen Scientists

This is another excellent KT initiative of our academic scientists in reaching out to the community and innovatively turning them into "Citizen Scientists" through the KPF project of **Prof Mark McGINLEY** and **Prof Jonathan FONG of the Science Unit** at Lingnan.

The project entitled "**Developing intergenerational education partnerships to encourage conservation of reptiles and amphibians in Hong Kong**" is carried out in collaboration with the Outdoor Wildlife Learning Hong Kong, a non-profit-making environmental NGO, and in line with the first city-level Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan for 2016-2021 as formulated by the Environment Bureau of the HKSAR Government to step up



biodiversity conservation and support sustainable development in Hong Kong.

The project will connect participants with nature by exploring distinct locations which hold populations of different exotic species. Participants with a variety of scientific background will be trained as Citizen Scientists and be involved in experiential learning in conservation work to increase their awareness and knowledge pertaining to local biodiversity.

To extend the benefits to a larger community, videos and reports of the Citizen Scientists will be put on environmental education websites and social media for the general public. A photography contest and an exhibition will be organised to reach the target audience and foster a biodiversity-friendly momentum in the community.

Prof Fong demonstrates a good example of researchers who undertake KT work not as a tag-on job, but as a built-in element right from the point of research to create a stronger linkage between research and impact. In his current **Early Career Scheme** project "**Developing environmental DNA approaches to study the ecology and conservation of endangered Hong Kong turtles**" with a RGC

fund of **\$827,773**, in addition to the research being conducted, he has planned to work with governmental and non-governmental organisations such as the **Agriculture**, **Fisheries and Conservation Department**, **Kadoorie Farm and Botanic Garden**, and **World Wildlife Fund** to develop appropriate conservation strategies. A funding of **\$144,000** was also granted by the **Croucher Foundation** under the **Croucher Chinese Visitorship** for a scholar from Hainan Normal University to work on the ECS project. The whole series of inter-connected research and KT endeavours are expected to form a good model of **bridging scientific research**, **environmental education and conservation**.

## **5.3 Promoting Effective e-Learning Modes**

Based on the **\$1.2 million General Research Fund (GRF)** project "**Pay-for-grades, e-learning and Educational Outcomes: Experimental Evidence from China**" funded by the RGC and with the support of **Intel**<sup>©</sup> **China, Prof WEI Xiangdong** of the **Economics Department** led a three-day **KPF** event entitled "**Promoting effective e-learning modes in** 

schools of mainland China and Hong Kong" over the summer holidays for over 60 education administrators, school principals, teachers and researchers from mainland China and Hong Kong to come to Lingnan and share the knowledge on e-learning. Strong partnership and support was secured from the Education Bureau in Zhongshan and Zhaoqing.

It was a typical professional development activity derived from research for practitioners when Prof Wei presented some preliminary results from his GRF project and showed how elearning can be used to solve the rising education inequality problems facing developing countries such as China, and how to evaluate the effects of e-learning using scientific methods.

Through visits to local schools in Hong Kong, this KPF event also facilitated good exchanges between the mainland delegates and their Hong Kong counterparts in promoting e-learning and sharing e-learning practice.

The enthusiasm of Prof Wei and Lingnan continues in promoting STEAM education in Hong Kong and mainland China. The first ever "**Mainland, Hong Kong and Macau Young STEAM Maker Competition**" was co-organised by our China Economic Research Programme (of which Prof Wei is the Director), the National Institute of Education Sciences and the New Territories School Heads Association, together with 13 associations in the field of education, information







technology and social services in mainland China and Hong Kong. About **80 schools** from the mainland and Hong Kong with **over 400 students and teachers** participated in the competition. Distinguished guests at the award presentation ceremony included the **Secretary for Education** and the **Secretary for Innovation and Technology** of the HKSAR Government, and officials from **the Liaison Office of the Central People's Government in the Hong Kong SAR**.



The impact of research and KT not only cuts across the boundary between the academia and practitioners, but also extends beyond the border of Hong Kong to benefit many more people.

## 6. Strategic KT Themes for Impact

In the Initial Statement to the UGC for the UGC KT Fund for the 2016-19 triennium, we have identified **Four Main Themes of our KT** work based on Lingnan's particular strengths in the arts, business and social sciences as a liberal arts university. We are glad to see some concrete outcomes achieved and some new initiatives taking shape already in the first year of the triennium under those themes, viz. –

#### **Revitalising Heritage**

\$19.5 million worth of externally funded on-going projects and 10 KPF projects funded by the UGC KT Fund in promoting the appreciation of our heritage and culture, among others.

#### **Informing Public Policy**

\$24 million of new projects funded by The Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust, an Equal Opportunities Commission project and 3 KPF projects, among others.

#### **Business and Economy**

Created the ground breaking Entrepreneurial KT Fund and related platforms, filed our first patent and trademark, working our first IP rights licensing, and reaching out to the industry in business seminars.

#### **China and Beyond**

Two Public Policy Research Fund projects at \$1.2 million and two forums held on the Belt and Road Initiative.

While technology transfer is expected to bring in financial return, it is our conviction that societal impact is a core objective of research and KT that our faculty members and students should strive for. Such impact is indeed a compelling mission of Lingnan at which "Education for Service" is our motto. We shall therefore continue to make it our strategy and direction to conduct KT for contributions to the social fabrics which are the building blocks for the city of Hong Kong to gather energy for balanced development.
